



THE GOLD STANDARD FOR CERTIFICATION IN FOODSERVICE MANAGEMENT

To maintain the Certified Dietary Manager, Certified Food Protection Professional (CDM, CFPP) credential, you must do the following:

- Pay your certification fee no later than August 31.
- Earn and report the minimum required 45 hours of continuing education (CE) every three years. Of the 45 CE hours, nine CE hours must pertain to Sanitation and Safety, and one CE hour must pertain to Professional Ethics. Required documentation must be submitted when a CE activity is reported via the My Certification page in your ANFP record.
- Beginning June 1, 2024, new parameters will be in place for CE Audit, according to CBDM policy. If you have reported less than 45 CE, you will be automatically placed into CE Audit. If you have not submitted any CE hours by May 31, 2024, your certification will be terminated, and you will need to qualify under a current pathway of eligibility, submit an exam application with fees and retest to become certified again.

Dawn started her career as diet aide in 1969, became Head cook for an ALF in 1970. Moved to SMH as prep cook in 1971.



Started to pursue her career in 1971. Enrolled in Penn State correspondently, majored in Nutrition. Flunked the last subject to get RD degree...Chemistry. So was unable to become an RD. Pursued the CDM course at SCTI with instructor Marian Aspinwall RD. and graduated in 1973 when ANFP was known as H.I.E.F.S.S., They changed there name to Dietary Managers and now known as ANFP. Through the course of her career she has worked at SNF's, ALF's, Memory care and Hospitals. She has extensive experience in the food service industry. In 1973 Doctors Hospital is where she started her career as CDM,CFPP & supervisor to the RD.. After 12 yrs. she moved into the SNF/ALF Facilities. Where she has continued her career. In 1976 she helped write the By Laws for Fla. Dietary Managers. 1978-80 she was State Sec. & again in 1998-2002. Through encouragement from Janet Gonter CDM,CFPP she decided to run for President of the Fla . Chapter. She was elected Pres-elect of Fla. In 2002 & was President from 2003-5. Dawn was on the Items writers committee for National from 2005-7. In 2001 she took the ALF Training course to be a ALF ADM. Pasted the course, but never pursued a career as an administrator. She has been a National proctor for the ANFP Dietary Managers course mentoring future CDM's. She was Policy & Procedure chair from 1976-1978 and 2000. Currently she is the state Sec. for FI ANFP and District 4 gulf trails, state Editor for the Fl. News Letter and Ways and Means Chair. On district level for District 4, Gulf Trails she was Pres. In 1974, 84. & 2016-17, Treas. 1992-94., Sec. 1984-86, 92-94, 99-2004, & 2009 -2014 and currently district Sec. She taught the Safe Serv sanitation course to ALF

employees at SCTI 2001 –3 until SCTI turned the class over to another org. She sat on the Advisory board for CDM'S at SCTI from 1990—2011 and the Advisory board for the Chefs Apprentice class at MCTI from 1992-2000. She was employed at The Pines of Sarasota for 5 yrs as assistant director. She states when she turned 65 in 2016 it was time to step down as director and let the younger CDM's have the stress. She states she could write at least 2 books of antidotes and stories from her 50 yrs in the food service industry. Dawn retired for 1 yr., got bored and for the past yr. has been employed at an Independent Living facility,-Holiday Desoto Beach Club. She states these days she little, to no stress, no budget worries, no rude staff snipping at you. Bless the past 54 yrs. Dawn was married for 50 yrs. Has 2 children and 3 granddaughters. For 25 yrs she enjoyed a pastime of playing softball, & 35 yrs of bowling. A blown knee and rotary cuff tear ended both. Dawn will be 72 yrs old in July.

The History of Florida ANFP

In 1965, the Florida Association of Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals (ANFP) chapter was formerly known as Florida HIEFSS (Hospital Institution Education Food Service Society) and began with 10 members sent in from other states. Ruby Puckett R.D. was appointed by the Florida Dietetic Association to organize the chapter in Florida and the state appointed Marge Knapp RD, (Registered Dietitian) and Marion Aspinwall RD, to work and support Ruby as they got the chapter up and running. Ruby and Marion continued to serve as consultants, advisers, and teachers to many members throughout the years.

During the forming stages of the chapter, each RD was given a course outline from American Dietetic Association (ADA) and assigned students. During the course, the 10 students along with the RD's, held its first organizational meeting in Orlando. When the course ended in 1965, the graduating class held its first meeting in St. Petersburg at the Princess Martha Hotel, when Vera Maclean served as President, and Ruth Jackson as Secretary/Treasurer. At this time, Florida ANFP had to combine their meeting with the ADA.

In 1967, Marie Walker served as President and began to promote the scholarship program. In 1969 the chapter, held its first State Meeting in Orlando when RD advisers were required to attend all district and state meetings.

Florida continued to grow until it became the state with the largest membership in the nation, and in 1970 the Florida chapter held its first National Convention in Ft. Lauderdale.

In 1972, The Marie Walker Scholarship Foundation was created, which has been sponsored by Lemon-X for the last 14 years, joined by Vitality Beverages in 2006. Since the scholarship was created, many students have benefited from the program.

Then, in 1984, the HIEFSS officially became known as the (Florida) Dietary Managers Association.

The last Florida National Convention was in 1993 in Orlando. In 1995, the chapter set up its first website and in 1996 The State Banner was reconstructed.

In 2005, the chapter celebrated its 40th Anniversary and honorees included: Marian Aspinwall RD and Ruby Puckett RD. Marian had retired since (now deceased), but Ruby continues as the program director for the Dietary Managers Program at Gainesville University of Florida's correspondence and online course.

More recently, the Dietary Managers Association became known as the Association for Nutrition & Foodservice Professionals (ANFP), as it is currently recognized today.

Florida ANFP has produced two National Chairs (presidents) Betty Deeter CDM, CFPP and Shirley Williams CDM, CFPP, and three Directors at Large: Lothar Sache CDM, CFPP (deceased), Janet Gonter CDM, CFPP (deceased), and Dorinda Carwell CDM, CFPP.

Through the years Florida ANFP has changed from 17 districts to 7, to form larger and more successful districts. Florida ANFP has been the proud winner of the following awards: Platinum State Achievement, Membership, Government Affairs, and Newsletter.


