

#### My CDM Journey by Andy Tygart, CDM, CFPP—Part One

I was born in Kokomo and we lived in Howard County until I was ten. In 1988, we moved to Crawfordsville where I eventually graduated from Crawfordsville High School in 1997. My interest in food began when I was old enough to crawl into the kitchen. My aunt used to babysit me when I was a toddler, and I'd always go straight to her kitchen and start taking out her pots and pans. As I got older, I gravitated to the kitchen whenever my mom or aunt was cooking. The smells coming from the kitchen were always so comforting. My dad was also a good cook, and I think having a male role model in the kitchen helped me feel more supported in my interests in cooking. One Sunday morning in 1988, my dad decided that I was ready to learn how to cook. He taught me how to make pancakes and to



this day it is still one of my fondest memories of him. After my parents split up, I had to take on more responsibilities around the house. One chore that I enjoyed was cooking. Money and food were usually in tight supply and I was forced to find creative ways to make food

taste good that didn't cost a lot to make. While I was in high school, the Food Network became very popular. I learned quite a bit from the likes of Emeril Lagasse and Alton Brown. As I was growing up, PBS was always on TV and I got exposed to cooking from people like Julia Child, Martin Yan, Jeff Smith, and Justin Wilson.

While I was in High School, I had several different restaurant jobs including Arby's and Applebee's. I also worked for a few independent places too. In my senior year, I decided that I'd attend Johnson & Wales University after an impressive tour of the Providence Campus. I was dazzled by the classroom/kitchens and the professionalism of the faculty.

As with many young people, I was full of dreams and aspirations. In my early 20's reality set in with my student loans hanging over my head. In my mid-20's, I wondered if I had made a mistake with taking the culinary route with my career. I decided that I wanted a better living and I looked into healthcare. I started nursing prerequisites for nursing and took a job at Bloomington Hospital as a nurse tech. Unfortunately, after six months I lost my job and was crest-fallen. I went back to the familiarity of the kitchen and put nursing on the back burner.

Eventually I found my way to Portland, Oregon and one day on the train I spoke with a stranger. He asked where I cooked and I found out that he had also gone to culinary school. We had had very similar career paths, but he told me that I should look into becoming a CDM. He said it was the best career move of his life. This conversation occurred in 2011. By 2016, I was a CDM.

#### My CDM Journey by Andy Tygert, CDM, CFPP—Part Two

Due to family issues, my time in Portland was cut short. I moved back to Kokomo in 2011. I went to work at a Restaurant but quickly I could tell it was faling. I kept seeing an add on Craigslist for a cook at a local nursing home. I figured, I would work there until something better came along. I ended up working there for five years. Two of those years, I was a dietary manager. My boss, Dave Kahn, believed in me and mentored me until I was ready to succeed him.

The day I got my credentials was such a happy one. I was immensely proud to see letter after my name. That exam changed my life. In 2016, I was able to get a car loan for the first time and I also bought my first house. Becoming a CDM, granted me the financial stability that had alluded me in my 20's and most of my 30's. I also loored a lot from my former boss, Bill Rees. He was a bit of a father figure and he guided me to be a good CDM, by patiently showing me what an executive director is looking for in a CDM.

I enjoy being able to change peoples minds about being a an mentor to others. My philosophy is to bring out the best in others and give them the tools to succeed.

I decided to get involved in ANFP as a means to level up my career. Like many of us, my job has limited advancement. I can achieve more in my company than where I already am. Volunteering with ANFP has helped me develop my career in ways my company doesn't have the resources available.



#### Manual Of Best Practices By Tom Thaman, CDM, CFPP

Over the last year, the Indiana ANFP Policies and Procedures have been revised. In 2024, ANFP developed global policies for all ANFP Chapters. This was done for consistency throughout the organization. These policies cover a wide range of issues regarding chapter management including officer job descriptions, banking, suggested committees for chapters, election of officers and qualifications. For almost 50 years, Indiana ANFP (formally DMA) had a set of policies that were written and revised through the years. These policies were outdated and antiquated and did not reflect what the current chapter. The new policies written by ANFP serves as our guideline of how we will be manag-

ing the chapter going forward. The policies are

broad in scope.

The Manual of Best Practice for Indiana ANFP provides more specific details for our chapter. They are not policies and do not supersede the ANFP policies but details our chapter current practices and allows the chapter to continue our awards program, newsletter and social media processes and outlines how our leadership structure.
