FAQ's

What is expected of me as a board member? As a board member, you are expected to actively contribute and participate in team meetings and/or calls. You may be assigned to one or several tasks to begin, but you will have support from the entire team. We ask that you volunteer for the board, only if you are serious about contributing to the revitalization of the chapter. You will also act as a liaison between the state chapter and the national organization.

What is the time commitment? It will be up to the team to determine how frequently they choose to meet. Typically, chapter boards meet 2 to 4 times a year either face-to-face or over the phone, depending on team members' availability. Depending on the board's initiatives, you may also be asked to dedicate time on projects and tasks for the chapter.
